

Watching her parents work hard labor jobs, sometimes working two jobs, Anesa experienced the struggles and saw the opportunities. She went on to earn two bachelor degrees in Business and Public Administration from the University of Northern Iowa in just three years. At the age of 23 she made her first bid for public office, she defeated a long time Waterloo Mayor in a competitive race to serve in the Iowa House of Representatives and become the youngest elected woman in Iowa history and the first Bosnian-American elected to any office in the country. She served two terms in the Legislature. Through her professional work as a Refugee Case Manager with the lowa Bureau of Refugee Services in Des Moines, lowa and as lowa State Delegate with UN High Commissioner for Refugees Refugee Congress, as well as through numerous volunteering engagements such as teaching English as a Second Language or establishing and conducting Green Card Clinics for the refugees seeking adjustment of status, serving as the founding member of lowa Interpreters and Translators Association, acting as a Cultural Ambassador for CultureAll, a non-profit organization which provides cultural diversity workshops and trainings for school children in lowa, or being an avid advocate for refugee women's rights.
